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Stamford Hospital heralds new era of patient care

Stamford Hospital took delivery of a brand new MRI scanner on Sunday 8 January which means Stamford residents can now attend appointments closer to home. The service began on 1 February, and the diagnostic team expect to scan between 20 and 30 patients a day.

Susan Brooks, Stamford Hospital's Matron and Site Manager, said: "Arrival of the MRI scanner heralds a new era of patient care at Stamford Hospital. We expect around 8,000 more patients a year will benefit from the enhanced service. The scanner forms part of the redevelopment programme



which started in December. When the works finish in July, we will be able to provide even more treatments for local patients from a hospital that is better equipped serve the needs of the community."

The scanner was delivered onto the Stamford Hospital site by crane via Morrisons' car park on Sunday 8 Jan.

The fully installed MRI scanner is housed in its own building within the diagnostic imaging department.

Stamford50 Commemoration

Planning for the Stamford50 commemoration is well advanced, with a programme of activities in prospect from the beginning of June leading up to the Georgian Festival 21-24 September. More details in the next Newsletter.

The question "Why Stamford" has been asked, so a little history. By the 1960s, the impact of the car was impacting on Stamford, in common with other towns. Added to this were the disappearance of family businesses, the loss of residents from the town centre and the expansion of Peterborough.

In 1963 the Deputy Planning Officer of Kesteven County Council (KCC), Dr. K.R. Fennell, produced a report "The Preservation of Buildings of Special Architectural and Historical Interest in Central Stamford" in which he pointed out that half of Lincolnshire's listed buildings were in Stamford and that maintaining them should be a matter of not just local but national concern. He suggested that an overall policy to protect these buildings would be a better approach than the then ad hoc system of considering planning matters on an individual basis. KCC agreed that the matter was urgent and discussions should be entered into as a matter of urgency with the Ministry of Housing and Local Government. Dr. Fennell prepared a further report in 1966 "Stamford - Buildings of special Architectural and Historic interest", which proved to be the most important document written about Stamford within living memory.

By great good fortune (or Dr. Fennell's commendable prescience), the government of the day was preparing to carry out four pilot studies of historic towns - Bath, York, Chichester and King's Lynn - but, as all the preparatory work had been done in Stamford, Dr. Fennell commended his study to the Ministry which, realising it would cost less, jumped at the chance to designate central Stamford as England's first conservation area in 1967.



Royal Arms Rescued

Two copies of the Royal Arms (each approx. 5' wide by 6' high) in terracotta brick were made by Williamson Cliff. One was installed at Royal Ascot racecourse and the "spare" was built in to the office wall on the Little Casterton Rd. site. When the brickyard buildings demolished. Chris Neal rescued the pieces of the



Royal Arms and took them to Bourne for safekeeping, where they remained under a hedge for several years (photo' 1).



When Chris heard STC that was interested in the Arms, immediately offered to return them to Stamford. The pieces were collected by New College in one of their vans (photo' 2) and taken to their building department (then in Gwash Way) where, once the moss and earth had been removed, they were

pressure-washed (photo' 3).

The Arms are now ready for installation, with a stone surround, on the paved area, owned by STC, at the bottom of Castle Dyke. The work, part of a refurbishment programme, will be carried out as soon as the requisite planning permission has been obtained from SKDC.



Book reading people for the visually impaired

A book 'reading' group for visually impaired people (vip's) needs new members. The group meets every month to discuss a selected book they have listened to on a disk which is provided. A new disk is then collected before leaving/at the end of meeting/session. The disks chosen are based on discussions about members' favourite authors and books.

Meetings bring together a small number of people with sight problems who are also able to discuss in a friendly atmosphere their difficulties and possible solutions/answers over a cup of coffee or tea during the early part of the meeting.

The group meets on the first Thursday of each month at Stamford Town Hall, beginning at around 10.30 a.m. until 12 noon.

Proposed Kier development on the north side of Kettering road

A number of Stamford residents travelled to Grantham to attend the meeting of SKDC's Development control Committee on 7 Feb, at which the proposed development was discussed. Ten spoke against the proposal, citing objections based on a range of material planning considerations.

After much discussion, lasting over 3 hours, the proposal went to a recorded vote (which itself was subject to considerable debate) and was rejected by all 14 of the committee members present.

Empingham Clock

The plan to put the Empingham clock on display in the Courtroom has just more hurdle to overcome - permission for transfer of ownership from Empingham Parish Council (which has very generously agreed to donate the clock) to STC must now be secured in the form of a licence from the Peterborough Diocesan Advisory Committee. Fingers are crossed! Local horologist Michael Lee (who has restored the clock in the past) has kindly

offered to oversee the move from the Museum Store in Broad St. to the Town Hall, so all now depends on the PDAC.




Adopt a Station


restorations from already hard-pressed budgets. Such wanton damage and destruction to our local environment not only inconveniences members of the public who may be

Holocaust Memorial Day

Holocaust Memorial Day was commemorated at 1100 on 27 January at the Holocaust Memorial newly-refurbished Michael's churchyard in High St. Around 30 were in attendance, HOLOCAUST including local residents, members MEMORIAL of the local Jewish community and

Stamford Town councillors. 27 JAN was chosen by the UK Government as it is the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz in 1944 by Soviet troops.

The numbers of those from different groups murdered during the Holocaust were read out (5.93m Jews, 2-3m soviet POWs, 2m ethnic Poles, 300,000-500,000 Serbs, 270,000 disabled, 90,000-220,000 Romani Gypsies, 80,000-200,000 Freemasons, 20,000-25,000 Slovenes, 5,000-15,000 Homosexuals, 2,500-5,000 Jehovah's Witnesses and 7,000 Spanish republicans), together with a reminder of the victims of genocide since WWII (Cambodia 2m, Rwanda 1m, Bosnia 8,000 and Darfur 200,000-400,000). All these men, women and children were killed, not because of anything they had done, but simply because of who they were.

The Mayor of Stamford, Councillor John Dawson, laid daffodils at the Memorial, chosen because the yellow colour and six-petal arrangement is redolent of the yellow Star of David badge that Jews were forced to wear under the Nazi regime in Europe. Others present then laid their own personal tributes.

The Jewish Prayer El Male Rachamim was read in English, followed by Last Post, a 2 minutes' silence and then Reveille, the trumpet being played by Lawrence Hayes, a Y10 pupil at Stamford School.

Graham Berkman, a member of the Peterborough Liberal Jewish Community then said Kaddish, most movingly in Hebrew, and this was followed by a Christian Holocaust prayer by the Rev. Philip Hall, which was read by the Rev. Andy Fyall, who concluded proceedings with Aaron's Blessing (Numbers Ch.6, verses 24-27).

It is intended that this commemoration should be an annual event and planning for 2018 is already under way.

Stamford's Information plaques

22 bronze information plaques (well-known to residents and visitors) were erected around the Town in 1922 by the then Tradesmen's Association. Over the years. four have gone missing - from Barn Hill (opposite the Methodist Church), Red Lion Square (All Saints' churchyard wall), the Leet Hall (the arches at the bottom of Castle Dyke) and St Leonard's Priory.

As a result of the splendid efforts of Peter Stevens four replacement plaques, funded by the Harry Skells Trust, have been commissioned and will be installed (in the order above) on 6 March, starting at around 1030.
