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The town was judged on Monday the 2nd of July. The route for 2018 was based on the Heritage of Stamford, passing many of the well known buildings of architectural and historical interest. We concentrated on showing the judge how we were trying to get people involved in caring for their town. A look at Burghley Estate Office was a last minute diversion as the gardeners had dedicated a doorway to Stamford in Bloom and given the town permanent window box displays. Residents had tidied corners and put out pots, hanging baskets and window boxes which it was a treat to see, even the dog outside NGI had a flower collar which made everyone smile.

Many supporters and volunteers were met at points on the route and at The Town Hall as well as The Crown, where much needed refreshments were provided. We had invited people to decorate chairs with plants which appeared as pointers round the route. The chair idea we hope will be adopted as it allows them to be lifted inside at the end of the day. We saw some great creativity, prompted by a competition we ran.

We took the judge to St Gilbert's C of E School where the children talked about all the eco based gardening they do with staff and families. A tour to and from the Community Orchard led the judge to comment that he had seen many private gardens worthy of special entry and we hope to develop that for next time. We plan to continue working on the areas adopted but will not expand until we have more volunteers. There are 40 places to be weeded and watered and more hands are needed because the most intense time is holiday time and twice as many volunteers are needed to stop the burden falling on so few shoulders.

This year was weeks without rain and quite exceptional. Yes, drought resistant plants are the solution with hindsight but decisions are made in the Winter. It has been good meeting people as we work and thank you for the many appreciative comments. Perhaps watering can be seen as a bonus as we have met some lovely people in the many hours we are about.

The generous contributions by the residents for the lavender has given the town a wall border that peaked at the beginning of August and will be trimmed by the end of the month to be neat for next year. The sunshine warms the oils to give a perfumed walk along Bath Row. An extra lavender wall border exists at Waitrose entrance too.

The pots have been modestly planted to establish suitable locations. It will take us some time to get it right and we hope that using perennials with occasional annuals will keep the cost down as well as giving all year round foliage. This project is about softening the corners giving something to smile about and eventually clean pavements to walk on. We clean and weed as much as we can but ask that each property looks after its own frontage to make a pleasant place for everyone, as customers do notice.

The EMIB awards are in September when we will have a report and advice..

Stamford Welland Academy host Festival of Thought

In June, Stamford Welland Academy held their first ever Festival of Thought in collaboration with other local schools. The festival saw the academy host an inspiring week of activities to deepen and develop critical thought and encourage different communities within Stamford to work together. The festival was attended by the Mayor, Deputy Mayor and Mayoress, pupils from Stamford schools and nationally renowned writers and speakers.

Discrimination was a hot topic at the festival and the National Holocaust Centre's Digital Exhibition attended the festival to raise awareness of xenophobia. They held workshops for primary and secondary students and Holocaust survivor, Dr Martin Stern MBE, gave a talk to the public about his experiences. Afterwards the audience were treated to a BBC-style 'Question Time', where a panel discussed how the Stamford community could come together to challenge discrimination among other topics.

Stamford Welland Academy also organised a variety of other activities throughout the festival, including an adult writing competition and a selection of talks on everything from poetry to law, encouraging the public to think creatively and challenge ideas. The festival ended with a celebratory fete at Stamford Welland Academy.

Sarah Oliver, Senior Leader at Stamford Welland Academy organised the event and said: "I am thrilled by how well the

CAB - Pop in Outreach Centre

Stamford has a long association with the military, historically not only through the Tenth Foot, Lincolnshire Regiment of our county, but also the opening of Stamford Agreedrens in 1916 by the

but also the opening of Stamford Aerodrome in 1916 by the Royal Flying Corps. This station was renamed Wittering on formatioin of the Royal Air Force in 1918. and has been a pivotal connecton with our community over the last century. With many other RAF bases established in the area, particularly during World War 2, the Stamford area has always had, and still reatins, a large population of serving military, reservists and veterans who have put down roots an dretired

after service with their families.

When the Royal British Legion launched a national Outreach Project, to offer information, advice and guidalce for serving members of the Armed Forces, Reservists, Veterans and their families, Stamford was chosen as one of the first towns in the

East Midlands to open a centre because of our military connections. Currently RAF Wittering, St George's Barracks,

North Luffenham and Kendrew Barracks, Cottesmore.

A "pop in" Outreach Centre was opened at the Stamford CAB in High Street on 19th August 2015, and, since that time, every Wednesday morning between 09.30 and 13.30. Considering the large number of serving military, veterans and families in this area the uptake has shown that very little help or support is required, which is at variance with media reports of how little support is being offered to the military community.

Volunteers are required to assist at this local facility, and continue to offer support for our military, family. A volunteer is not required to be a member of TRBL, so why not visit the CAB "pop-in" one Wednesday morning, and see first hand the services we offer.

Staff and patients across Stamford Hospital marked the 70th birthday of the NHS with lots of nostalgic fun across the hospital this week.

The celebrations kicked off with the unveiling of a special time capsule on Wednesday 4 July. Items donated by various departments have been sealed in the engraved capsule as a way of showcasing life in the NHS present day. It's hoped that the contents will be uncovered by the future generation of healthcare workers

when it's re-opened in 2088. Items include: A finger splint used for support or immobilisation of a limb, Phlebotomy kit used to draw blood from a patient and a letter from current CEO, Stephen Graves about his hopes for the future of the NHS.

The capsule was unveiled by the hospital's longest serving staff member, Su Mansell, who has worked at the hospital since 1984.

The festivities continued on Thursday 5 July and former current and former staff members were invited to reminisce over a cup of tea and cake at a community event held at the hospital. Guests were also given the opportunity to browse a selection of historic artefacts from Stamford Hospital's museum.

Long standing staff member Su Mansell created an incredible NHS themed cake for the event, which was cut by Betty, a former nurse. Betty started working in 1947 as a nursing sister and still pops in to see staff.

Rob Hughes, Chairman of North West Anglia NHS Foundation Trust, said: "It was excellent to see so many members of staff, past and present coming together with representatives of the local community to celebrate one of the country's most beloved institutions.



LINCOLNSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL HIGHWAY GRASS CUTTING

Grass cutting funded by the County Council falls into two categories:

- Safety Cutting This involves a 1 metre wide verge cut (mainly in rural areas)
 adjacent to the carriage way and visibility areas, such as junctions and bends which
 was carried out 3 times per year; and is undertaken primarily by LCC contractors.
- Amenity Cutting This is carried out in areas of amenity value and the standard funding has been for 7 cuts per annum. This area of work has been carried out by a mixture of providers which includes District and Parish Councils.

Stamford Town Council (STC) informed residents in 2016 that due to budgetary constraints, the approach to highway grass cutting funded by County Councils would change.

LCC's Environmental Maintenance budget was reduced. The number of safety cuts was reduced to twice a year. The service level of the amenity cuts during 2016/17 would be retained but future reductions to the allocated budget were anticipated, reducing to a zero level in the financial year 2017/18.

Following discussions with LCC, STC were informed that South Kesteven District Council (SKDC) would not now undertake any grass cutting on behalf of LCC. LCC's grass cutting programme for 2018/19 commenced in April 2018. Should STC be prepared to take on this activity a transitional relief payment for Stamford equating to £4,350.00 total contribution for 2018/19 would be granted.

There is 98,871m² of urban highway grass cutting to be carried out in Stamford. If STC does not take this activity on LCC will only cut these locations twice in April and September. STC has negotiated with LCC and their current contractor to obtain the most cost-effective level of service within the town possible in the financial year 2018/19. STC has scrutinised its financial position and following good fiscal management, it has identified the net cost of £3,228.00 within its 2018/19 finances which may be directed towards this activity. However, Stamford residents must be alerted to the fact that if they wish STC to support LCC and keeping Stamford looking at its best in future years such cost will need to be added to the Town Council's Precept. The cost of £3,228 would add 0.6% or 0.40p on the current Band D charge. If STC increases the precept by the current inflationary 3%, the charge per Band D charge would be £2.61. It should be noted that LCC is **ONLY** legally obliged to maintain the highway verges for reasons of safety. STC is not legally obliged to maintain the highway verges but is volunteering to support LCC in this activity to ensure Stamford verges are presentable.
