

Welcome to the Summer issue of Stamford Town Council's News, which once again is packed full of information about the Town and activities scheduled throughout the coming month.



Disability Awareness Workshop

The employment rate for disabled people of working age is 51.7% while the rate for non-disabled people is 81.7%. The Government is committed to ensuring that this gap is closed and all disabled people have the opportunities and support that they need to play as full a part as possible in society, including gaining and retaining employment.

Over 7 million people of working age in the UK are disabled or have a long-term health condition. It therefore makes sound business sense for all employers to make sure that disabled talent is not excluded from their workforces.

The events will have something to offer for all employers, whether just starting to think about their attitude towards disability or already signed up to the Disability Confident scheme. It's a time for open and supportive discussion.

The aims of the workshops are to help employers build confidence in recruiting and employing people with disabilities and health conditions.

This includes identifying the advantages of employing people with additional needs, sharing good practice and knowledge of local support to help local businesses on their Disability Confident journey.

The recent workshop held presentations by employment advisors within the NHS mental health team and Stamford Job Centre providing lots of food for thought. A speech from a supported internship tutor and student instigated fascinating discussions. The connections made at these events can be so beneficial to the local community.

Stamford Cemetery

Stamford Cemetery located on Little Casterton Road in the idyllic stone town of Stamford. The Cemetery was founded by the Joint Burial Committee in 1855. The Cemetery contains a number of Commonwealth War Graves throughout the Cemetery; Stamford Town Council holds plot locations for each of these War Graves, which can be made available for any interested parties.


Other notable persons laid to rest within its grounds include celebrated persons of the town (The Gibson Family known for their iron work still found throughout the town, Robert Newcomb owner of Stamford Mercury, Albert Cliff Mayor of Stamford 1919-1920 who established the firm of Williamson Cliff Ltd with Mr F.W. Williamson, Sir Malcom Sargent famed conductor and Edward Christopher Blackstone one of the founders of Blackstone & Co Ltd agricultural manufacturers).

Of course, Stamford Cemetery is also the resting final place of many people's ancestors and loved ones each of which contains its own story, Nicola's story being one of those.

In 1969 Nicola's mother was pregnant with her first child. During the pregnancy she contracted toxaemia and due to illness went into a coma at 7 months pregnant. Nicola's father was faced with a difficult choice, as the doctors told him the only way to save his wife was via an emergency caesarean, however there was little chance Nicola would survive. Nicola was born 2 months premature on 25th August 1969 so tiny she could fit in her father's hand. She was christened and lived 5 hours before sadly passing away.

In those days the hospitals would arrange for new-born's to be buried with old people who had also died, and they found a family that was willing to let Nicola be buried with their grandmother on the proviso that Nicola's parents could never know the location of the grave, nor be able to visit.

After a family member contacted Stamford Town Council, nearly 50 years later, it was revealed that the joint burial never happened, and it turned out that Nicola had been buried in the

to deliver the devastating news to her parents.

But that's not where Nicola's story ends; the family have now purchased the plot, installed a headstone and had a very moving graveside service. Their little girl is no longer lost, and they have been granted the rights for their ashes to be buried with her when the time comes and be reunited as a family once more.

Unfortunately, Nicola's story is not an uncommon one and many people are unsure of the final resting place of their loved ones. This is where Stamford Town Council can help. Due to technological advancements in record keeping plot locations are readily available all that is required is a name, within seconds Stamford Town Council can search all of their 19k records and match that name to a plot number. 
My thanks go to all who have been involved in the project and in particular those who have contributed funds, The Skells Trust, XT Group, Stamford Town Team and Stamford District Lions.

Proposed Centenary seating in Stamford

2018 was a very significant year with regard to the British Armed Services. Along with the anniversary of the end of the First World War, the Royal Air Force, and RAF Wittering also celebrated their 100 years of service to the nation.

It was thought Stamford should record these milestones and consider some way of having a permanent record of the centenary year. Discussions over the last few months of 2018 resulted in a positive suggestion from Mr. Don Lambert (local photographer) who had seen some external bench seats when visiting Wales.

After discussion with former Councillor Tony Story at the Town Council and the local branch of the Royal British Legion, Don visited various businesses in Stamford to see if he could raise the necessary funding, along with the Council for three seats. Both Don Lambert and Tony Story are retired from the RAF and who were in the Photographic branch serving at RAF Wittering in the 70's and 80's.

Many local individuals and businesses contributed including: Alex Pistolas, Ash Ltd 2, Peter Stevens, Maureen Jalili, Patricia Reed, Paul Mills, Andrew Moore, Dave Hudson, Tom Riley, Councillor David Brailsford (LCC), Councillor Brian Sumner (SKDC and Town) Councillor Brenda Sumner, SKDC) The Green Man, Councillor Bill Turner, Stamford Endowed School, Vision Express Stamford, M & S staff raffle, Sue Bishop, Councillor Mike Exton (SKDC) Councillor, Councillor Breda Griffin (SKDC), The Crown Hotel, David Taylor (SKDC) and the Stamford Civic Society.

The above mentioned District and County Councillors contributed part of their annual community grants but also gave personal donations and Stamford Town Council Grant fund covered the cost of one of the seats.

The seats have now been installed in both Broad Street and Castle Dyke.

Both Don and former Mayor Tony Story would like to thank everyone involved for their generosity and support given to help create this permanent memory in Stamford of those who fell in both World Wars and later conflicts and the special relationship between RAF Wittering and Stamford.

It is hoped these visual and tactile reminders of the past century's conflicts will be seen and used by all age groups including our younger generations acting as a permanent reminder of sacrifices made to ensure our freedom today. 
Town Hall Trivia


The south facing window in the Council Chamber contains a beautiful stained-glass roundel, depicting the town crest. Dating from the late 19th or early 20th century, it looks as if it was made for the room, but in fact it is a relatively recent addition.

It came from Walsoken House in St Peter's Street and was probably made for Edward Joyce, the manager of the Stamford Mercury, who lived there for more than thirty years until the early 1920s. Joyce may also have given the house it's name as his wife Mary was born in Walsoken.

Early in the new millenium the then owner of Walsoken House removed the roundel. It was purchased by former Mayor Cedric Cadman, who then donated it to the Town Hall "for the good of the town".

The roundel was installed in 2003 by the Peterborough firm Artists in Stained Glass and since then the three lions have kept watch over all the meetings held in the Chamber. And on a sunny day it positively sparkles.
