Stamford Mid Lent Fair

March 23rd - 28th 2020

Stamford's annual event the Mid-Lent Fun Fair is back. March 23rd-28th, with entertainment for all, including over 100 rides, stalls and food and drink outlets on Bath Row and Broad Street. It will start with an opening ceremony by the Mayor of Stamford at 6pm, at the Waltzer ride located in Broad Street at the top of Ironmonger Street. It lasts for a week and fills the streets and squares of the Town Center with stalls, amusements and 'all the fun of the fair'.

Today, the roundabouts and stalls stay for 5 days and block all the main streets of the town; during the Middle Ages, the fair lasted for two or three weeks and was a trading occasion of some importance to the nation. The King sent his servants to Stamford Fair to buy green and scarlet cloth for himself, his Queen and his household or to give as presents to other Kings or visiting dignitaries. Foreign luxury goods and other supplies were purchased there for the court and for parliament. The nobles and monasteries replenished their stocks and bought the newest fashions; merchants from abroad, doing the rounds of England's marts, always fitted in a visit to Stamford Fair.

A great national event, then, was under way in Stamford during Lent.

From the Jown Clerk's Desk

The Town Council, like all Town and Parish Councils across the country, has a statutory duty to set its Precept which is the Town Council's element of your Council Tax.

It was disappointing that very few Stamford residents attended the public meeting convened November last to discuss this important subject. Whilst the Precept figure set for 2019/2020 was able to be slightly decreased on the previous year, an increase for the coming year 2020/2021 of £5.10 has been requested on a Band D Property: a 0.10p per week increase.

These figures are the result of increased costs which the Town Council must incur, like all households, such as increases in insurance cover, utilities and general inflation. In addition, this year there has been an increase in Employer Pension Contributions which is outside of the Council's control. The modest 2020/2021 increase, however, was mitigated by the Town Council initiating additional revenue streams, such as obtaining a licence for weddings to be conducted at the Town Hall, combined with continuing efficiency savings.

The Annual Stamford Parish Meeting was held on Monday 16 March 2020 at 7pm in the Town Hall. The purpose of this meeting was to discuss Parish Affairs. Parish Affairs can be any issue, or topic, that specifically affects Stamford and its community. It provided an excellent opportunity for Stamford residents to express their views and to engage personally with their Ward Councillors.


"Every member of the team is taking the role very seriously, they are wonderfully enthusiastic and I am delighted with their progress. A combination of competence and enthusiasm is so important."

Town Hall Trivia

Currently on display at the Town Hall is a bust of the young Queen Victoria, produced by John Marriott Blashfield's Stamford Terracotta Company. Made of a fine-grained, unglazed yellow stoneware it is a copy of a bronze original created - according to a catalogue of Blashfield's wares held in the Phillips Collection - by Weigall. This is almost certainly the work of, sculptor Henry Weigall, born in London in 1798, died in Melbourne, Victoria in 1882.

John Marriott Blashfield, was born in Westminster in 1811 and by the 1840s he was operating an ornamental terracotta works in Millwall, with a showroom in Central London. In 1858, he was invited by the 2nd Marquess of Exeter to set up a factory in Wharf Road in Stamford; the Marquess owned land at Wakerley which had rich deposits of a clay particularly suitable for making terracotta.

Blashfield's Wharf Road site included four kilns and a 100 foot long showroom. The firm gained an international reputation for quality and design, won medals at the 1862 and 1867 Paris Exhibitions and gained numerous commissions in the U.K. and abroad. By 1870, the range had grown to over 1400 items, but poor business practices led to the downfall of the company; it entered voluntary liquidation in 1875 and the works and stock were sold off. John Marriott Blashfield died in London in 1882.

Herbarium for Lincolnshire

In 2017 the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust received a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) for the Love Lincs Plants project to work in partnership with the Natural History Museum in London, The Sir Joseph Banks Society, Lincolnshire Naturalists' Union and the University of Lincoln. Over the last three years, they have worked to inspire and train a new generation of botanists, to preserve a historic herbarium collection and to create a new Lincolnshire herbarium for the 21st century.

So why are we creating a contemporary herbarium for Lincolnshire?

Herbarium specimens are essentially dried pressed plant samples conserved on archive quality paper and stored in a controlled environment for research purposes. Associated collection data are remarkable and irreplaceable sources of information about plants and the world they inhabit. They provide the comparative material that is essential for studies in taxonomy, conservation biology, biodiversity, ethnobotany, and paleobiology, as well as being used for teaching and by the public. They are a veritable gold mine of information and provide a valuable research tool for investigations into climate change, pollution and habitat change.

Creating a present day collection of plant specimens requires people to visit all parts of Greater Lincolnshire at all times of year to ensure a representative range of plant species is collected. This project is not only training volunteers in plant identification, but also in traditional archiving skills including the collection, preparation and mounting of botanical specimens.

Stamford Town Council first became involved with the project in Spring 2019, when it gave permission for plants to be collected at Stamford Cemetery. On 29th January a small group of botanists from the South Lincs Flora Group, accompanied by the Deputy Town Clerk, Sarah Dorson, met up to collect early flowering species from

the site. These included naturalised species such as Winter Aconite, Snowdrop and Sowbread, as well as





more weedy species such as Annual Mercury and Petty Spurge.

Two specimens of each plant were photographed in situ and then carefully dug up, labelled with a unique reference number and placed in a plant press. It took some time to remove the rather sticky clay soil from the roots of some specimens and a freshening breeze made it difficult to place some of the specimens neatly, so a few were placed in plastic bags and curated later indoors. A small sample of leaf tissue was removed from one specimen and placed in a labelled bag containing silica gel, to be used for DNA analysis. The specimens will be carefully mounted by other volunteers, and then one specimen will be stored at the Natural History Museum and the other at the Sir Joseph Banks Centre in Horncastle.
