

Mayor's Civic Service

A magnificence of mayors processed through historic Stamford on Sunday, marking the Town Mayor's civic service and raising of the Armed Forces Day Flag.

Armed Forces Day in the United Kingdom is an annual event



celebrated in late June to commemorate the service of men and women in the British Armed Forces.

Councillor Anthony J. Story, the Mayor of Stamford, was joined by the Right Worshipful the Mayor of Lincoln, and the Town Mayors of Kettering, Corby, Market Deeping, Rushden, Sleaford, Whittlesey and Wisbech.

CCF Inspection

On the afternoon of Friday 5 MAY, the Mayor, Cllr. Tony Story and Deputy Mayor, Cllr. Max Sawyer, accompanied by the Mayoress and Deputy Mayoress, represented STC at the Stamford Endowed Schools CCF Biennial Inspection. The day concluded with an address to the cadets by Rear Admiral Kimmons in front of the cricket pavilion.

PURPLE4POLIO

For over 30 years, Rotary International and its members have been committed to fighting to eradicate polio across the world. The number of polio-endemic countries has dropped from 125 to just three, with over 2.5 billion children receiving vaccinations thanks to the help of Rotary. The chance to eradicate polio is now closer than ever before thanks to the efforts of Rotarians across the world. It is important to keep fighting and finish the job which means continuing our support for at least three years after the last case of polio is reported, in order for the world to be officially declared polio free.

The latest campaign in Britain and Ireland, Purple4Polio, uses the purple coloured crocus as a symbol as this matches the dye painted on the fingers of children who have been immunised.

At a local level, in the late Autumn the three Rotary Clubs in Stamford co-operated in the planting of 10,000 bulbs at various sites around the town, notably on the Recreation Ground in five sites and also on the roadside in Wharf Road opposite St Mary's Surgery. All the sites have signs indicating the reason for the crocus planting and acknowledging the Rotary connection. The Rotary clubs were assisted by pupils from the Bluecoat School and students from Stamford Welland Academy.

On Monday the 13th March, the Mayor of Stamford, Councillor John Dawson, visited the Recreation Ground sites with Rotary and Civic Society representatives and pupils from the Welland Academy. It was a glorious day and presented a perfect photo-opportunity to publicise the campaign. Local photographer, Don Lambert, took the accompanying photographs.

Those attending include the Presidents of the three Rotary Clubs; Alex Evans (Rotary Club of Stamford), Geoff Mayling (Rotary Club of Stamford Burghley) and Mary Dowglass (Rotary Club of Stamford St Martin's). Tony Springett (Civic Society) Also in attendance were David Fisher, Jim Guthrie and David Tilson from the Rotary Club of Stamford, Eileen Day, Colin Gibbons and Roger Adams from the Stamford Burghley Club and Steve Bull the lead SWA teacher with some SWA pupils.

Kingsgate Community Church

KingsGate Community Church was delighted to help transform an area of the Stamford cemetery. Over twenty people from the church, who live locally, joined Sarah Dorson, Deputy Town Clerk, in the clearing of ivy and weeds from the cemetery's more historic graves.

"The cemetery is an important place of remembrance and reflection for many" commented KingsGate's Pastor Jim Thody, "it was great to play a part in reviving and restoring areas of it."

"Everyone worked so hard and made such a difference, it was amazing to see the transformation of some of the old graves dating back to 1900s. After a couple of hours clearing they had filled two ton bags supplied by CGM and quite a few black bags that CGM kindly disposed of free of charge." Commented Sarah Dorson

KingsGate has Sunday congregations of over 2,000 people, who meet mid-week in homes across the region, seeking ways to express their Christian faith by serving their local neighbourhoods.

BIG CLEAN



South Kesteven's 'Big Clean' to set higher standard for clean and tidy streets
South Kesteven District Council has announced a major programme for street cleaning which aims to set a higher standard for the district and will be asking residents to help identify areas to target.

SKDC's Big Clean will see an initial 12 week programme positively transform the district's 'grotspots', tackling not only litter but also weeds, fly-tipping, graffiti and broken street furniture across the district's 365 square miles.

An initial £450,000 will see a number of new teams formed to tidy areas and undertake work identified through an intelligence gathering exercise and operations will begin in August.

£37,000 has already been committed towards the community cleaner grant scheme to further promote locally resourced cleansing within the district. The Big Clean project will add a further 41 per cent to this funding with £15,000 of investment. So if you know of a 'grotspot' contact South Kesteven District Council.



Stamford Poetry Stone

Stamford Poetry Stone was unveiled at a gathering in St Michael's churchyard on April 26th 2017. Town councillors, representatives from the Arts Centre, artist and stonemason, Beatrice Searle, all Stamford's former poets laureate as well as children from local schools including St Gilbert's, Great Casterton, Malcolm Sargent, Copthill and Bluecoat. The former poets laureate stepped up into the carved footprints on top of the stone to perform poetry written for the occasion.



The installation, conceived by Stamford poets, artist/stonemason Beatrice Searle and Karen Burrows of Stamford Arts Centre - and made possible by the kind donations from the Harry Skells Estate Trust, Stamford Arts Centre and Ketton Stone - has been carved by artist and former Lincoln Cathedral stonemason, Beatrice Searle and is an enduring and interactive monument marking Stamford's commitment to poetry. The poetry stone, positioned in the natural amphitheatre of St Michael's Church square, will be available to everyone as a platform to step into the footsteps of Stamford's poets laureate (the footprints are those of Darren Rawnsley, Stamford's first poet laureate) and recite their own words and verse.

The new benches have proved a very popular resting place for residents and visitors (or simply somewhere so sit and watch the world go by), even on days when the weather is less than clement. A welcome development is the reappearance of the Artisans on Friday and the indications are that there could soon be a waiting list. It would be helpful if smokers could make a point of using the litter bins, rather than the planters (or the floor) for their cigarette ends. Separating the bins from the benches was deliberate, as it was felt that wasps and smells would be better away from those using the benches, although the bins could be moved closer if there is a public demand.



Museum store


The suggestion of transferring ownership of the Store and its contents to STC was well received by LCC, which is currently investigating the various options and will report back to STC shortly.

Sir Malcolm Sargent



The service will include music from the Malcolm Sargent School Choir, the Stamford Endowed Schools Chapel Choir and Stamford Brass. Town Council Supporting Young Graduate

Cameron thanked the Town Council for affording him the opportunity to study local politics and government at such close quarters as it provided him with the opportunity to complement his course work with practical studies and directly relevant work experience.



Six months ago, Age UK Lincoln announced it was expanding its services to cover the areas of North and South Kesteven. Now known as Age UK Lincoln & Kesteven, the independent charity is keen to replicate their current service delivery by developing accessible services across the Kesteven area. A drop-in Information and Advice service offering free, impartial and confidential information, much needed benefit advice and assistance with form filling is already available in Grantham three times a week. Work is also progressing to develop their help in the home, personal care and gardening services to ensure that anyone over the age of 50 can feel independent and confident in their own home.

Recent statistics from Age UK National reported that of the 66,100 older people in the East Midlands, 29,300 of them felt lonely on a daily basis. Loneliness can be caused by various changing aspects in our lives and can potentially have a negative effect on our mental and physical health. 'Loneliness is considered to be as bad for your health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day.'
