BATTLE OF BRITAIN SERVICE & FREEDOM PARADE 19th SEPTEMBER 2021



September's parade marked the 60th anniversary of the granting of the Freedom of Stamford to RAF Wittering. The mayoral procession left the town hall and made its way through the historic Georgian streets to the United Reformed Church, where a special service celebrated the enduring relationship between the town and the Station. During his sermon, Reverend Dr Peter Stevenson spoke of the relationship between Stamford and RAF Wittering, embodied in the Stamford Spitfire which was paid for by the people of the town during World War II. RAF Wittering Station Commander Jez Case gave a reading, and there was an impassioned recitation of a special poem on the Battle of Britain by Rob Elks, Stamford's Poet Laureate. After the service, hundreds of Stamford's citizens lined Broad Street, where a series of rousingly familiar war-time tunes filled the air, courtesy of The Band of the Royal Air Force College Cranwell. RAF Wittering treated onlookers to a flawless display of precision drill, before the Mayor of



Stamford, Councillor Gloria Johnson led wreath-laying at the war memorial. 'Freedom of the Town' dates from the Roman times, when troops were not allowed to enter a town or city bearing arms without the express permission of the authorities. Nowadays, it is a ceremonial honour showing the ties between a borough and a particular regiment.

In 1940 Stamford decided to buy its own spitfire, collection boxes were distributed all over the town and raised the \pounds 5000 required. This beautiful model is at Stamford Town Hall.

Browne's Hospital "Windows 21" Project launched

Browne's Hospital Appeal, "Windows 21" was launched in June. The appeal will fund a project to encapsulate the stained glass windows in the Chapel at Browne's Hospital and preserve them for future generations. Browne's Hospital is an iconic building in Stamford which has stained glass dating from 15th Century. The glass is classified as being of national importance and is amongst the finest of its time. The windows date from 1475 and depict Saints, the Virgin Mary, and what is thought to be the face of the building's founder, the wool merchant William Browne. They are the work of a local craftsman named Glazier!

David Wallington, Curator of Browne's Hospital, said they were hoping to raise £100,000 to conserve the windows, having had a specialist survey carried out. The Almshouses at Browne's which offer flats, occupied by 13 residents and managed by Trustees are well-known to us, but the maintenance of this historic building, which is managed and funded separately, is often hidden and very costly.

Councillor Andy Croft, who is a board-member of the Browne's Hospital Trust, further explained the project. "The stained glass is recognised to be under threat from the environment in the next 30 years and it is recommended we encapsulate it; in modern terms to double-glaze the glass, to preserve its beauty but protect it from pollution and the elements."

The fundraising campaign has secured £10,000 from the town's Harry Skells Estate Trust, £5,000 from The Church of England's Church Care grants scheme, and £1,000 from Lincolnshire Historic Churches Trust. Other sources of national and local funding are being pursued.

The Browne's Hospital trustees, who are all volunteers, hope to be able to restart their tours of the building from July. They had proved extremely popular before the pandemic and are a way of raising money towards the upkeep of the building.

Another By-election for Stamford

Following the passing of Councillor Mike Exton, October saw the second by-election to be held in Stamford this year. Cllr Exton, was a long-standing member of South Kesteven District Council and Stamford Town Council, representing All Saints Ward, and his loss presented vacant seats at both. There was also another available seat on the town council, after Cllr Julie Clarke (St Mary's ward) stepped down in July.

SKDC Chief executive, Karen Bradford, said about the role: "Public service by being a district or town councillor allows people to raise issues they feel passionate about or use their skills to help shape the future of where they live.

An election date was set for Thursday, October 28th, and in accordance with local government regulations, candidates were each nominated by a proposer and seconder who are residents in the relevant ward. With four candidates standing for the District and five for town, the next month was set aside for campaigning by leafleting, door to door canvassing and on social media. Sadly, this process was interrupted by the death of MP Sir David Amess, which, out of respect, was marked with a temporary cessation of campaigns.

On the day of the by-election, even though turnout for both wards was only around 20 per cent of the voting population, voters were decisive and the following individuals were elected to office.





Stamford All Saints Ward, South Kesteven District Council Richard Cleaver (Independent), 496 votes

Richard has lived in Stamford for over 20 years. In May, he was elected to represent Stamford West on Lincolnshire County Council. Since then, he has become aware that much more also needs to be done by conscientious hard-working councillors at district level. His priority is making sure that the people of Stamford are listened to and their concerns responded to. As a district councillor, he wants to improve the existing GP service in Stamford, ensure that development is sustainable and fit for purpose and ensure that all the town's transport needs are recognised. Richard believes in keeping local government local and opposes any single Lincolnshire super-council proposal which will further marginalise Stamford.

St Mary's Ward, Stamford Town Council Lisa Brewin (Liberal Democrat), 379 votes

Lisa is a further education teacher, who has lived in Stamford since 2005. As a mother of two teenagers, She is keen to support local families with access to green space, support for local schools and better healthcare provision. She is also a supporter of local environmental projects, such as the Millstream Project and the Climate Action Group. This summer, she volunteered with Team Stamford to plant wildflowers on North Street and was a volunteer steward at the Stamford Diversity Festival.



All Saints North Ward, Stamford Town Council Amanda Schonhut (Conservative), 255 votes

Amanda is a local independent business owner and wants to ensure our business community continues to thrive. A heritage photographer, she is passionate about conserving the town's historical importance for future generations, and that must include ensuring any development preserves that heritage. It is important to her that the community retains its healthcare services. She also believes families should be free to grow up in a safe and secure environment and that's why she supports our local police force. As a town councillor, Amanda wants to work with all other elected representatives to ensure Stamford remains the close-knit community it is famed for.

News from Stamford Town Council's Climate Action Group



The UK has one of the lowest levels of tree cover in Europe - 13% vs an average of 37%. At a county level, Lincolnshire has one of the lowest levels of tree cover in England but, we're planning to change that fact with a town wide tree planting programme, in conjunction with Lincolnshire County Council.

Trees are vitally important for so many reasons.

- They improve health and mental wellbeing
 - They create vital habitats for wildlife the Oak tree alone supports 2,300 different species
 - They remove pollution from the air, and they are incredibly important for both climate change mitigation and adaptation
 - They lock up carbon from the air in their branches, trunks and roots, helping to reduce levels of the greenhouse gas in our atmosphere.
 - They will also be incredibly important to help us to adapt to the effects of global warming through flood
 prevention and reducing urban temperatures hrough shade and heat absorption.

HARRY BURTON: THE PHAROAH'S PHOTOGRAPHER

Famous Stamfordian photographer Harry Burton was born on September 13th, 1879, at 18 Burghley Lane. He was the fifth of 11 children to William and Annie Burton. According to the 1881 Census, William was a journeyman cabinet maker, joiner, carpenter and upholsterer. Harry was educated at St. Martin's School from the age of four, the family moving across to 5 Church Lane when he was about ten years old.

In 1890, the Burton family came into contact with Robert Henry Hobart Cust, a man of independent means and cousin to John Henry Cust, MP for Stamford. A philanthropist and art history scholar, Robert Cust offered to pay for Harry's education, moving the boy into his home for the duration of his schooling. Cust's area of expertise was Renaissance Art, and in 1896 when he moved to Florence to make a further study, he took Harry along as his secretary. It is during this period that Harry developed a keen interest in photography.



While living in Florence, Harry met wealthy American lawyer, Theodore Davis who was sponsoring various excavations in Egypt. When Cust returned to England in 1910, Harry decided to remain and travelled to Egypt as Davis's photographer. After some time. Harrv was promoted to **Director of Excavations** and then later to Photographer in Chief for the Metroplitan

Museum's Egyptian Expedition. However, it was in 1922 that Harry embarked on what was to be the most important assignment of his career.

For some years, British aristocrat Lord Carnarvon had been funding an expedition led by archeologist Howard Carter to find the lost tomb of King Tutankhamen. After many unsuccessful attempts they were about



to abandon the project, when in November 1922, Carter finally discovered the elusive tomb in the Valley of the Kings. Realizing the importance of keeping a detailed photographic record of the excavation and its hoard of priceless artifacts, he engaged Harry to undertake the task. Harry's photographs were seen by millions of people around the world and caused an instant sensation. The images went on to influence contemporary culture and to this day are applauded for their vivid portrayal of this historic event.

During his time in Egypt, Harry met Minnie Duckett and married her in 1914. Minnie was his constant companion during his travels and she meticulously described the famed Tutankhamen 'dig' in her diary. Over the years, Harry returned to Stamford regularly, using his eldest brother John's home at 5 Belton Street as a base while in England. Harry died in 1940 at Asyut, Egypt, possibly due to diabetes, whilst Minnie died in Florence in 1957.

November 2022 marks the first centenary of the

discovery of Tutankhamen's tomb. To commemorate this, Stamford Civic Society will award Harry Burton a Blue Plaque in recognition of his contribution to the greatest discovery ever known in the field of Egyptology.

Former Stamford Town Mayor Mike Exton, died following a short illness, devoted much of his life to public service, both on Stamford Town Council and South Kesteven District Council.


